

# Topical Fluoride for Children (TFL-CH)

Learn how to improve your HEDIS<sup>1</sup> rates. This tip sheet gives key details about the TFL-CH measure, best practices, codes and other resources.

<b>Measure</b>	<p>The percentage of children ages 1 - 20 years who received at least two topical fluoride applications within the reporting year as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Dental OR oral health services<sup>2</sup></li> <li>• Dental services</li> <li>• Oral health services</li> </ul>										
<b>Eligible members</b>	<p>Children aged 1 - 20 years as of December 31 of the measurement year. <b>Allowable gap</b>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• No more than one gap in continuous enrollment of up to 31 days during the measurement year.</li> <li>• To determine continuous enrollment of a beneficiary for whom enrollment is verified monthly, the child may not have more than a single one-month gap in coverage.</li> </ul>										
<b>Best practices</b>	<p>American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP)/Bright Futures recommends:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Fluoride varnish application at least once every six months for all children and every three months for children at high risk for dental caries.</li> <li>• Performing oral health risk assessments on all children at every routine well-visit beginning at 6 months of age.</li> <li>• Recommend use of fluoridated toothpaste starting at eruption of the first tooth: rice-grain sized amount for children younger than 3 years, and a pea-sized amount for most children starting at 3 years of age.</li> </ul>										

**Best practices**

United States Preventative Services Task Force (USPSTF) recommends:

- Primary Care Physicians (PCPs) prescribe oral fluoride supplementation starting at 6 months for children whose water supply is deficient in fluoride. To find out what public water is fluoridated by region, refer to:

- PCPs apply fluoride varnish to the primary teeth of all infants and children starting at the age of primary tooth eruption.

Other Recommendations:

- Remind parents that bottled water is generally not fluoridated.

- Check with parents if member has received a topical fluoride treatment within the last six months prior to current visit.

**Helpful coding tips**

- Administrative enrollment and claims data is required within the reporting year for measurement.

Medical Record Documentation

- Documentation is required of at least two instances on different dates of service.
- If the parent reports their child already received topical fluoride at a dental visit, this can be documented in the patient’s medical history.

Who can bill for varnish application? How many times per year will I be reimbursed for applying varnish?

- Application of topical fluoride varnish by a physician or other qualified healthcare professional is reimbursable with CPT code 99188 for children 0 to 5 years of age, up to three times a year.

Who can apply topical fluoride in California?

- Fluoride varnish must be applied by a physician or other qualified health care professional, a clinic staff member who works under the supervision of a qualified health care professional, or other allied health providers who have completed one of the recommended online fluoride varnish trainings.
